Fact Sheet #23: Transfer of Manure or Wastewater Off Farm

Introduction

Owners of animal feeding operations (AFOs) defined as concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs) are required to obtain a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit from a designated state permitting authority or from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for states that are not authorized (Alaska, Idaho, Massachusetts, New Mexico, and Oklahoma). (See *CAFO Fact Sheet #2: Do I Need an NPDES Permit for My Livestock or Poultry Operation?* to determine if your operation is an AFO or CAFO.)

One of the requirements unique to large CAFOs is to keep a record of transfer of manure or wastewater to other persons. See the chart on the next page to determine if your operation is a large CAFO.

Producer Checklist

Step 1. Prior to transferring manure, wastewater, or litter to other persons, a large CAFO must provide the recipient with the most current nutrient analysis. The required analyses are nitrogen and phosphorus. (EPA regulations do not require the recipient to keep records of manure received.)

Step 2. The following records must be kept and maintained for five years: Date, Recipient Name and Address, and Approximate Amount of Manure, Litter, or Process Wastewater transferred to another person. See record sheet on page with conversion table.

Step 3. Check with your local county and state agencies for additional records or requirements.

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Time Line for Compliance

The owner of a livestock or poultry operation defined as a CAFO has a "Duty to Apply" for an NPDES permit. The deadline for an NPDES permit application is as follows:

Type of Operation	Permit Application Deadline	
Existing animal operation historically defined as a CAFO by EPA rules:		
And operating with current NPDES permit.	180 days prior to expiration of current permit	
But operating without an NPDES permit.	Immediately	
Existing animal operation NOT historically defined as a CAFO by EPA rules:		
But now a CAFO.	Deadline set by permit authority but no later than April 13, 2006	
Due to its original size but now a CAFO due to expansion.	As soon as possible, but no later than 90 days after expansion	
Due to a past exemption under the original CAFO rule (e.g., species exemption) but now a CAFO following expansion.	April 12, 2006 or 90 days after expansion whichever is later	
Newly constructed CAFO:		
Large enough to be a CAFO	180 days before beginning operation
